


Dear Parents/Carers and Students,

It has been a very busy and interesting term and it is lovely to have seen so many students taking part in such a diverse range of performances and activities. Thank you to all students and staff who are giving so much of their time to enrich both themselves and our community. Student leadership has grown considerably this year. Presentation evening was an uplifting experience at the Copthorne Hotel and it was lovely to see our Year 11 students from last year celebrating their record breaking results. Very well done to the staff and our supportive parents for helping them to receive by far the best results that Summerhill students have ever achieved. Thank you also to our wonderful new choir and show band who entertained on the evening and added a lovely warm and celebratory atmosphere - all student led. Our current Year 11 students are on track, having just completed their Mocks (well done for all of the hard work which will pay dividends in the summer) to beat last year's record results. Provision for, and attendance at revision sessions for Year 11 has grown considerably; well done staff and students.



There are many highlights from this term, including: the wonderfully moving Remembrance occasion arranged by Mr. Glattback and numerous students, with thanks to members of the Kingswinford Royal British Legion who attended; the superbly organised Anti-Bullying week organised by our JLT students and Mrs. Sprouting; charitable events such as Children in Need and Movember; our choir performing at the Christmas Lights switch on in Kingswinford; the wonderful Christmas Tree created by our students for Wordsley Church and the embryonic growth of our Summerhill Radio station.

It is wonderful to see that so many of you have joined to follow our Twitter feed @SummerhillSch. Most areas of the school and staff have now also launched Twitter accounts for communicating the wonderful work that is going on at Summerhill, and to efficiently convey announcements and information. The main @SummerhillSch account is following most of the Summerhill Twitter accounts to make it easier for you to find them. Please bear in mind that these accounts are predominantly a broadcast medium, since we cannot expect staff to be available to respond to queries 24/7. If you have queries, these are best addressed through more conventional means, by email, telephone, by post or in person. We see great benefit in the Twitter medium when used positively by our community and we would encourage our community to celebrate and retweet successes and information whilst remembering that we teach our children that negativity on Social Media is counter-productive for any community; positivity is what makes wonderful communities blossom.

The school is improving dramatically and quickly. Thank you to the many, many students, parents and staff who have found the time to give us feedback about the positive culture change from this September. We are aiming to go beyond Ofsted Outstanding judgments, since this would cap our aspiration. We have started a very quick improvement curve but we are not blind to the fact that we have many areas where we need to improve. We have had a small number of prolonged staff illness and absence issues which have unfortunately affected some classes, but we have replacement staffing arriving from January (a new Head of Computing and English teacher); our apologies for the issues that this caused. We are certainly not setting ourselves up as perfect, however, we are aiming to close upon being as perfect as we can be. Please continue to give us feedback, whilst please also recognising that dramatic improvement takes some time; this will help us to focus where we next need to improve. A reminder is perhaps due that there is a parental contacts flowchart on our website to assist in knowing who to talk to, dependent upon what type of issue you need to raise; staff email addresses are on the school website. Staff are routinely being allowed to visit the best schools in the country to learn from national best practice, the ideas from which are being implemented here.

What have our Summerhill Scientists been up to this term?

Our Scientists have been busy this term, preparing for Mock examinations, developing and expanding their knowledge of the best subject in the curriculum, and carrying out engaging and exciting practical investigations. Here's just a snapshot

Students used their knowledge of metal structure and properties to demonstrate how Silversmiths shape and colour metals:

- Made slow motion, time lapse videos documenting the effect of surface area on the rate of diffusion.
- Carried out flame tests to identify the mystery metal:

news from their area of interest of expertise. Have a Science related hobby or interest? Share it. Are you going or have you been anywhere of Scientific interest or importance? Take pictures, write it up and share it with the Science Community.




Media Department Diary -

Prizes were available for the most detailed (and the straightest) but the real prizes will be awarded tomorrow to the students who have the best recall of today's learning!






October 17th 2017 - A Meeting of Minds

October 31st 2017 - 'The Call'

Year 10 Media students tried out their skills in filmmaking today, when they were given a 'five shot' challenge and armed with video cameras. This required them to storyboard, direct, operate cameras, act, edit and produce! And in Ben's case, there was even time for a little keyboard practice too!

Later this year, the class will be required to produce a short film as coursework for their GCSE. On today's evidence there is some really promising work on it's way!

<u>November 14th 2017 -</u> Past, Present and Future

One of the most interesting Year 11 documentary ideas this year is the 'Past, present and future' documentary being worked on by Amelia, Ryan and Tom.

This group is exploring students who have, are or will be attending Summerhill. It's an ambitious undertaking but the group have made a good start. Today they reviewed archive interviews with past students who have gone on to achieve great things in their chosen area.

They will follow this up with interviews of current students and are even exploring ways in which future students could be involved in the production. This is definitely one to watch!



November 24th 2017 - This Class Can

Year Ten Media students took to the streets (of Summerhill) today to discover teachers' views of the Media. Armed with copies of a 'This Girl Can' magazine advertisement, they asked staff their views on the use of stereotypes, the representation of gender, the reinforcement of ideologies and the role of the media in shaping perceptions.

Without exception, the students were mature and professional in their roles as interviewers and were able to elicit some fantastic responses and engage in informative conversation.

The buzz in the room when they returned was fantastic and the activity had clearly broadened their understanding of the topic.



Reading at Summerhill has been taken to a whole new level with all Key Stage 3 students starting the Accelerated Reader Scheme. In the last 3 weeks, over 600 books have been checked out of the library. Each Key Stage 3 student now has a designated literacy lesson on their timetable and are registered with the AR reading scheme. Pupils have taken a reading test which has given them a range of books suitable for their reading level. Students are expected to read a book every 2 weeks, take a short quiz on their understanding, log their results and then progress through the programme.



Students with an average of 85% quiz scoring tend to make the most reading progress so if you are getting 100% results, that's great, but maybe you should challenge yourself with more difficult books. Quizzes can be taken at home and the link is on the literacy page of Firefly. Can't find a book in the library that you like? There is an AR book finder tool on the Firefly literacy webpage where you can search books you have at home to check their reading level. If they are within your ZPD, go for it!

Remember, the government suggest students should be reading for 20 minutes every day. Are you?



Some students are blasting through the scheme already and achieving great things! The highest word count so far is awarded to Megan Gwinnell with 677, 501 words read! Furthermore, only three weeks into the system and Isabelle Hincks has done 9 quizzes, passing with an average of 92%, Elizabeth Tranter has read 6 books, passing with an average of 95%, Darmini Mehan has completed 4 quizzes all at 100% and Emelia Henley has taken 6 quizzes, averaging at 90%. A massive well done to these students!

Key Stage 4 has not been forgotten. One tutor period each week is designated to literacy where both KS3 and KS4 students will read for 20 minutes. Whilst KS3 students have their AR books, KS4 students have been supplied with a range of fiction and non-fiction reading material which will further their studies not just in English, but across the curriculum. The

material has been differentiated so there is something for all reading levels and interest. Reading a book at home? Bring it in and read for 20 minutes during tutor time each week!

Finally, every two weeks there is a whole school literacy focus. This term students have learned about commas, apostrophes, speech marks, capital letters, full stops and question marks. SPAG marks are awarded in exams across most subjects now so remember the rules and keep standards of literacy high in every lesson!



We are pleased to report another successful and active term for the Geography department...

Year 7 students have been producing their own weather forecasts as part of the 'Weather and Climate' topic. Having learnt about Britain's climate and different ways to describe weather, such as using the Beaufort scale and assessing the degree of cloud coverage, we put the students' new-found knowledge to the test!





Year 8 students have been studying the continent of Africa and the country of Kenya as a case study. Recent lessons have seen students examine Kibera, the shanty town on the outskirts of Nairobi. After students described and explained the impoverished conditions for residents, they undertook a decisionmaking activity to suggest appropriate and sustainable improvements for people living in the area.



Year 9 students have been introduced to the explosive and earthshattering topic of volcanoes and earthquakes! The students became the experts for a lesson when studying the eruption of the Soufrière Hills volcano on Montserrat. They had to work in groups to respond to a sequence of helicopter reports and choose appropriate actions to take to keep the islanders safe. The photos show some deep concentration while making important decisions!

Year 10 students have spent this term studying tectonic hazards, such as the Icelandic volcano Eyjafjallajökull that erupted in 2010. As well as understanding the course content, we have been trying to find effective ways of remembering how to spell the volcano. The best mnemonic for the volcano's name so far is 'Every year jaffacakes are found joking and laughing loudly. All jaffacakes ooze ketchup under lemony layers'! Students have created revision resources that can be used repeatedly through Years 10 and 11 to help retain information in the long-term memory. The photographs show Lucy and Mya creating mind maps, Megan and Oliver creating packs of revision cards and Charlie designing 'chatter boxes' full of key facts and information. These clever ideas should help them ace the next exam!

Year 11 students have been finishing the GCSE course content and revising hard for their mock exams. We have been very impressed to see large numbers of students attending the 8 am revision sessions each Friday. The photo shows over 50 hard-working students with a little chocolate motivation

We are looking forward to 2018 with you all.



Religious Studies

It has been an exciting half term for students of RS at Summerhill School. Year 7 have been reflecting on the importance of community. They have evaluated the reasons for and against being part of a community and researched the way in which people choose to show their identity and belonging. Students have learnt about the Khalsa and how Sikhs who are baptised into the Khalsa identify themselves by wearing the Five K's. Students were able to compare this to secular communities, such as the Summerhill community that students are a part of. Here is an example of the investigative work that took place into finding out how and why the Khalsa was created in 1699.



Students in Year 8 have been getting into the festive mood through the study of religious celebrations, including Hanukkah, Diwali, Christmas and many more. Students have analysed the significance of these religious festivals in light of a growing secular country/world in which we live. Students were asked to

present their findings on whether they thought these festivals hold the same meaning as they did when the festival(s) first originated.

Lily Catello (UMH) said: "I enjoyed learning about Diwali and finding out all the facts about why this festival is celebrated by Hindus across the world. The best thing about this festival in my opinion, is the moral of the story of Rama and Sita. It was interesting to have analysed the similarities and differences between religious festivals. I now know that Diwali and Hannukah are both known as 'the festival of lights'". Katherine Barnett (DBT) said: I've enjoyed researching and finding out all about how religious people celebrate festivals as part of their commitment to their chosen faith. It has helped me understand that although religions have different festivals, some of their beliefs and teachings can overlap".



This half term, Year 9 students have been applying the subject knowledge they acquired from last terms' topic on Jewish beliefs to the horrific treatment of the Jewish community during the Holocaust. We have assessed the ways in which Jews were affected and the reasons behind the treatment they were made to endure. As part of their assessed work, students compared what they had learnt to the ways in which other communities were penalised and treated at the same time, including groups of people who were disabled, homosexuals, the travelling community and many others. Ultimately, students were asked to judge who they thought was affected the most during the Holocaust, providing reasons why they thought this through evidence they had collated. Students were encouraged to consider reasons why others may disagree with their opinion to show that they had thought of more than one view point.




Year 10 students have been investigating the change in attitudes towards marriage and family life. Students have enjoyed developing their own opinion on various areas of this topic, including marriage, divorce, remarriage, equality of men and women in the family and gender prejudice and discrimination through debates and exam practice questions.









Year 11 students have been working hard in preparation for their Religious Studies mock exam. They have been focussing on two topics; 'Muslim Belief', which looks at the fundamental beliefs and how these differ between Shi'a and Sunni denominations within Islam. The second topic 'Living the Muslim life' encourages students to apply their subject knowledge and understanding of the Muslim faith to analyse the Five Pillars of Islam and the importance of these beliefs on Muslims today.

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


Welcome to the Summerhill Maths Department's edition of the Newsletter for Term 2.




Drama Club

The club are now working on a very original performance piece to add to the Christmas Cracker. So watch this space.




Year 10 Languages Masterclass Birmingham University 8th November


