Our Story

1666 was a notable year in the history of our nation. England, recovering from the ravages of Civil War, was the subject of ridicule across the continent following defeat against the Dutch, and with unpopular decisions made by its ruler Charles II now appeared to have few allies among its European neighbours. The year also saw England gripped in an epidemic the size of which had not been seen since the Black Death and when matters looked like they couldn't get any worse a devastating fire tore through the heart of its capital.

Yet, 1666 is recorded in English history as being a *annus mirabilis* or And in 2020 we as a community are embarking on an era of change. 'wonderful year'. At a time when England was under threat, the academic community made considerable steps forward. Isaac Newton's revolutionary discoveries on calculus and gravitation were and boys in the forthcoming years. The challenge of Covid-19 has made in this year. Parliament, following plague and fire, made crucial developments in civil engineering and architectural planning to prevent further disasters. Samuel Pepys was busy writing diary entries which he wouldn't have possibly considered would hold such an important place in the disciplines of literature and history. This was an era of enlightenment, a time where thinkers were encouraged to break the mould and established practices.

History never repeats itself, but it does often rhyme. The parallels between 1666 and 2020 are clear to see. A nation being forced into adaptation, with the best minds working together to ensure social and economic survival.

1666 and 2020 will also go down as momentous years in the history of this school. As the Great Fire of London burned through London, entrepreneur and politician Thomas Foley lost several of his factories and stockpiles. Kidderminster preacher Richard Baxter persuaded Foley to think about what he could give back, along the lines of Romans 12: if your 'gift is to give, then give generously'. 1666 was the birth of the idea of our school. At a time of great uncertainty and peril, Foley invested his fortune, his time and his knowledge into ensuring that the next generation were better equipped in dealing with problems which came their way. The idea was a new and exciting concept. Build a charitable or 'hospital' school for local Black Country boys. Ensure they were fed and clothed in a safe and secure environment and train them to be tomorrow's leaders.

The idea worked.

For over 350 years, Old Foleyans have made notable achievements in an array of fields (have a look at our alumni lists to spot several notable names).

Perhaps the reason for this history of success is that OSH has always had a history of adaptation. Students don't take for granted what has come before and seek to change to meet the demands of the time.

The school has had approval to become co-educational for our Year 7 entry so we will be able to offer our full programme to both girls led to staff producing virtual lessons for self-isolating students and understanding how technology can enhance learning has come on leaps and bounds.

On the school's 350th anniversary, the Headmaster asked guests, Old Foleyans and current students and staff to consider what Thomas Foley would have thought of his legacy as he looked down from Old Swinford Cross onto Founders building. It is not the brick and mortar of the wonderful Founders buildings, but his values that we live, and that we take out into the wider world that are the legacy of Thomas Foley and I hope that upon consideration you are able embark on your own journey by attending OSH.



Your Sixth Form Journey at OSH

Students at Old Swinford Hospital complete either 3 or 4 A Level/BTEC subjects in combination.



Getting in

Along with subject specific requirements, students will need the minimum grade requirement of GCSE Grade 5 or above in at least six subjects. including English and Maths



The School Day

Students have 5 lessons per week per subject. Students attend tutorials at 8.30am and are expected to be in school during independent study periods.



Independent Study

Students with no timetabled lesson will work in the sixth form centre, or boarding house if they are boarders.



Privileges

Students can sign out at lunchtime to get their lunch if they wish and can sign out in the afternoon if they have no more remaining lessons that day.



Support

Tailored and ranging support available for students seeking clarification or help in their subjects or with their own wellbeing.



Enrichment

Students are expected to commit to a Wednesday PM Games slot and commit to an academic enrichment offer e.g. EPQ, Thinking Skills, MedSoc etc.



Prospects

One to one support for applications to competitive pathways from staff and external professionals.



Academic Rigour

Timed Questions (TQs) ensure regular routine examination practice, as well as intervention and monitoring support.

How to choose your subjects

Working out what options to choose may seem straight-forward for some people but it is crucial for students to pick their correct combinations. Before you decide it is important to consider:

- 1. What you enjoy studying currently. Remember you will only be studying three or four subjects in Sixth Form. Picking a subject because 'it may look good' or 'it's what someone has told me' is never a good idea.
- 2. What subjects are required for future career aspirations you may have. For many university courses certain A level subjects are required. For example, to progress to study Medicine, you will almost certainly need to study Biology and Chemistry. For Engineering, you will generally need Maths and Physics. Speak to a member of the Sixth Form team during your applications to find out which subjects may be required. If you're not sure about what you want to do after Sixth Form study, that is completely normal. Make sure you choose what you enjoy and a range of subjects.
- 3. What subjects you are particularly adept at studying. Our entry requirements list specific needs for subjects. They are there to state your suitability for studying that course.
- 4. What combinations work well with each other. Maths and Physics; Biology and Chemistry; History and Politics some subjects have certain elements of overlap.

Jack Davis, graduate of 2019



Pippa Grossett, graduate of 2014


